A Special Artifact for our Log Cabin

This antique rope bed was donated to the Concord Historical Society by Bill and Donna Klumb. This bed was brought from Germany by Bill's great, great grandparents Authur and Amanda Goldheimer, who had seventeen children. The rope is strung across the bed frame, this technique was used before bed box springs were developed. A thick mat stuffed with corn husks would have been used on top of the rope frame for sleeping. This type of bed is period appropriate for our 1850, William R. Look log cabin. Many thanks Bill and Donna!

Lots to do at the museum: We are busy on many different fronts, but always keeping in mind how our artifacts, photos, and documents can help us tell better stories about our township.

We are now using an updated version of the Past Perfect software. Thanks, Cindy, for loading it and transferring content to the new computer. Our focus is now on cataloguing. Another task is to put in better order the paper trails and manuscripts what we have been archiving for more than 25 years. Thanks, Sharon for all your assistance as we sort and file.

We are now thinking about ways to make our museum more thematic, for example, by putting together a school-days corner. To anchor a country kitchen scene we already have a built-in cupboard, wood-burning stove, and antique refrigerator. Other possible themes include family fun (music, games, toys), farming implements, woodworking, and blacksmithing.

This newsletter's photo page highlights items that serve to remind us of the days when we were kids in Concord. While most of us would agree that we all did lots of chores, we had fun, too. We need to preserve artifacts of childhood not just for their nostalgic value but for how they can nudge us into telling stories that today's kids can relate to.

To represent all of those who grew up here, we are sharing a delightful portrait of the Koeppler children (circa 1905/1906), donated by Robyn Reed. Included in the portrait are Elsie (Koeppler) Buske, William C. Koeppler, and Leona (Koeppler) Hemke. Their parents were William and Ida (Goose) Koeppler, who lived on the farm previously owned by the Yates sisters.

Concord has a deep tradition of skilled wood-workers and carpenters and the next item adds a chapter to that story. The toy cupboard now at our museum was built by William F. Wendt for his granddaughter Renee Baneck, making her a happy gal on Christmas Eve, 1952. Eventually, she would have to share it with her sister Devonne.

Speaking of Christmas, Ernest Berkholtz received a lovely storybook in 1915, now part of our children's book collection. We also have boys adventure books that once belonged to Delmar Wendt and Carl Schildbach. Books like these help us to imagine what it was like to be a kid decades or even a century ago.

Ponies and other pets were a big part of childhood in Concord. We could fill several panels with photos of kids and their special buddies. Here we have a photo of Carl Friesch, Garth Gilbert, and Diane Adsit on their mounts. Nancy Buth is playing with her dog. Diane and Nancy were friends who lived in Sullivan.

Now that it's baseball season, if you're at Concord Park, think about the generations of ball players who've pitched, hit, and run bases there. We have a softball that was donated by the Jim Gilbert family. We know that Ed Schultz liked to recall playing ball on a local team. And what about Bakertown's victory over Concord (10 runs to 5) in the summer of 1900? If you have stories or photos to share about any teams or games, please share them with us.

Finally, many thanks to all those who donated items or volunteered their time during the past year. And please come and visit the museum—during our new open hours or by appointment.

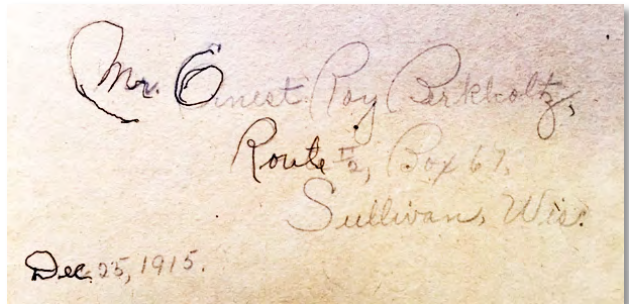

Please send in your 2019 membership with the convenient envelope attached to this newsletter. Please remember, your donations “beyond” membership are tax-deductible and are put to good use.

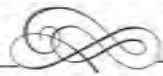
